



HOUSING SENIORS | CREATING HOPE | PILOTING CHANGE

NWPP PROGRAM SUMMARY

Northwest Pilot Project (NWPP) is Portland's primary agency serving low-income seniors living principally in Portland's downtown core. NWPP's clients are seniors aged 55 and older who have an average income of \$985 per month or less and are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

NWPP'S PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Housing: NWPP provides advocacy and emergency financial support to prevent evictions; emergency and transitional housing; assistance finding permanent affordable housing; housing vouchers; and relocation and moving assistance. From July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011, NWPP's Housing Program provided services to 1,446 individuals, and provided housing for 484 seniors who were homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

Transportation and Services to Seniors: NWPP provides services to help seniors remain independent in their own homes. Services include transportation to medical appointments, grocery shopping, and help accessing medical and legal services. Last year, NWPP provided services to 600 individuals.

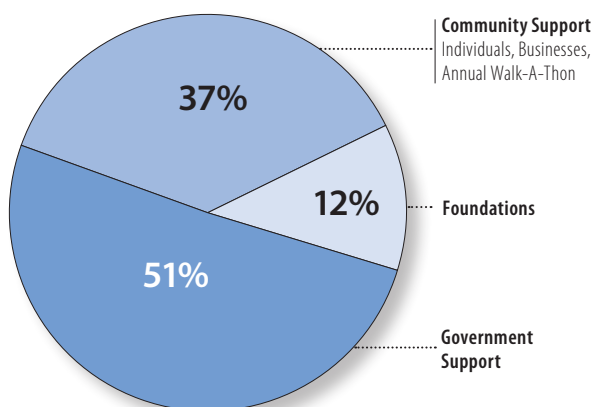
Emergency Services: Many NWPP clients have emergent needs in connection with their housing. NWPP's Emergency Fund allows staff the discretion to meet these needs. Frequently, a relatively small investment today is able to prevent greater problems in the future.

Advocacy: At the core of the direct services provided to clients is NWPP's advocacy to preserve and protect affordable housing in Portland's downtown area. Over the last 32 years, 2,400 units have been lost. Through the work of NWPP, 1,200 units in replacement housing have been built in downtown Portland for low-income seniors, and over 2,000 units city-wide for very low-income families and individuals.
